### Service Coordinator's note:

Service is one of the ways students develop empathy, and it is also the platform where students, through small actions, bring about a change in their mindset and in the community. At Genesis Global School, our endeavor is to make the students more self-aware, empathetic, and responsible citizens through service as action. It is an area where they can display leadership skills, contribute to global causes by acting locally. Apart from being a mandatory requirement in the Middle Years Programme, it is also a platform to encourage student agency.

In this term from July 2022-December 2022, the students of MYP 1-4 were involved in a plethora of student-initiated activities and projects, along with sessions on International Mindedness and Gratitude - which are the foundations for our students into hone themselves into being changemakers. The session began with orientation sessions and brainstorming ideas for the village project. Another highlight of this term was the Indo-Argentinian collaboration in the Climate Action project. Students of MYP 2 who were a part of the project, where they exchanged ideas about the solutions they could take up with their Argentinian counterparts. The session began with orientation sessions & brainstorming ideas for the village project. We also collaborated with Fair Trade for the advocacy project on responsible consumption - SDG 12, where students, through their creativity, raised awareness about the issue, created a website. Another two projects were making toy houses for PYP playroom with recycled materials and recycling papers to make '*Thank You*' paper tablets for the school support staff during the Christmas season.

This term, the students also went for their first service trip after two years of the pandemic to Jim Corbett (MYP 1-3) and Abhaneri (MYP 4) where they engaged in different service activities apart from adventurous pursuits.

The first service award was also given out to young changemakers from MYP 1-DP 2. We also saw the return of Christmas Carnival post pandemic where our students worked hard to make bookmarks with affirmation quotes, scented wax tablets, candles, cloth bags with recycled material and conducted games to raise funds for the village project.

The service team has worked collaboratively to inspire students and guide them to unlock their potential to the fullest.

In this newsletter, the students have shared their reflections on their service journey and their feelings about community service. Some of our advisors have also reflected on their experience of guiding and facilitating the student endeavors. We are thankful to the parents who have shared their perspective about the importance of Service and how it has been impacting their children.

I hope you all have a pleasant experience flipping through the pages and immersing yourselves in their service journeys.

CAS, which stands for Creativity Activity Service, is at the core of the International Baccalaureate (IB) programme. It aims to provide students with meaningful learning experiences outside of the classroom to broaden their understanding of the world, heighten their sense of empathy and help them become compassionate and balanced individuals.

This year, to begin with, multiple orientation sessions were conducted to give the students a detailed understanding of CAS and its requirements. After the orientation sessions, students had a clear idea as to how they had to proceed through their CAS journey to make it an enriching and enjoyable experience.

Post the pandemic, it was amazing to see our students getting involved in multiple hands-on service experiences-from spreading awareness on various social issues through special assemblies, street plays, and ongoing participation in teaching and training work at Ruhi Foundation School in Nangli Wazidpur village. Their motivation and involvement was tremendous.

The students initiated various CAS experiences such as the 2022 yearbook, monthly newsletter for the boarding house, consumer chronicle, making organic compost, and re-using the old tree guards by repairing and painting them. They also took up activities to promote healthy living like yoga, cycling, gym, dancing, etc. The outbound CAS trip to Abhaneri camp helped them further to explore their potential and work collaboratively with their peers. They also conducted various fundraiser events to help the underprivileged community. Besides this, it was also a pleasure to see proactive participation by parents toward some of our initiatives. 

While MYP 3 students brainstormed about the changes that happen as one moves to a new country – should one forget one's culture to embrace the new culture completely through the activity of "head, heart and hands", explored many immigrant students 'letters to get a better idea.



The MYP 4 students explored **International Mindedness** through the activity "What's in the name" where they drew their interpretation when they hear the name Bella. They discussed how one's judgement is colored by past experiences and beliefs, in turn, sharing their understanding of International Mindedness. MYP 1-4 students then proposed some steps they can incorporate to promote the same in their daily life and at school.




### **SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT : Vivaan Mathur** of MYP 3

His work had been chosen to be part of the River of Hope - a 200 flag procession in London and part of The Platinum Jubilee Pageant this June and now displayed at the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich, London.

*The students of MYP 1-4 raised funds for the village project at the Christmas Carnival, on 17<sup>th</sup> December,2022.* Games were led by MYP 2 & 4 students. The stall also included selling of bookmarks with affirmation quotes created by MYP 1 students, customized beads rings made by Isha Saini of MYP 1, cloth bags made of recycled cloth made by MYP 2 & 3 students, scented candles by Eshal Ratra, of MYP 1 and scented wax tablets by Rishika Malani of MYP 2.

The Carbon Heroes Program is an independent service initiative that is optional for students. It is a paid program where students grow greens and learn to make composting. For every enrolment, the Carbon heroes have planted two trees to fight against global warming. In the third semester, the students will collaborate with other climate change leaders and students worldwide, while the fourth semester is selection-based entrepreneurial training. A total of 69 students have enrolled in this program. On 16th December, the students of PYP-DP had their first introductory session, where they interacted with one another and pledged themselves to the cause fight against climate change and pollution. They cut the cake and received their first kit from the Carbon Heroes CEO, Mr. Amit Choudary.

Arriving in MYP 1 and gaining knowledge about the subject 'Service as Action' was a new experience for me as I never thought that this topic can be covered as a subject. Thinking about 'Service as Action' suggests 'Helping Others'. After many informative orientations and presentations, it turned out that I was right. I summed up that 'Service as Action' is a subject which inspires you to act in the world to make it a better place. By taking small steps, one can bring small changes in the world. Being in MYP 1 we were asked to attempt three student-initiated activities and a village project. Thinking about these student-initiated activities, I pictured myself around many animals and people with a smile on their faces. We were to first create a planning sheet explaining about the three activities we will be doing. Since I love dogs, I decided to collect money and donate food and other materials to a Dog-Shelter. Secondly, since I am creative and love art, I decided to make cards with affirmation quotes and distribute them to community workers. During the process we were informed that there would be SAA camps where we would get a chance to attempt a few activities like wall painting and graffiti. Hearing about this news, I chose my third activity as 'SAA Camps'.

I thought that we would just have to choose our activities and start doing them, but that was not it. Next, we had to create S.W.O.T Analysis for each of the activity. We had to include our strengths, weaknesses and opportunities which we might get. Then we finally got the chance to start working on our activities. After each step we had to click pictures as evidence. Since, my first activity (Donating to a Dog-Shelter) was a lengthy process I was suggested to start on my second activity side-by-side to save time. It was a lengthy process as I had to collect money from other people as a donation-drive. Some people would just not agree to donate money, so it was tough searching for people who felt compassionate towards dogs. My goal was Rs. 15,000 but in the end all my hard work paid off because I collected Rs. 10,000! After completing this step, I did a lot of research on different Dog-Shelters near me. I visited Posh Foundation and a few more Dog-shelters near there but they wouldn't let us in neither they wanted any donation. I didn't give up and went home and found another dog-shelter which seemed great! I talked to them on the phone, and they agreed for our donation. I bought the materials which were Rice, Eggs and Pedigree. Excitedly, I went there, looked around the shelter and gave them the products I bought. The owner of the dog-shelter introduced us to a few dogs, which were mostly blind or paralysed. All of the dogs were given up for mercy-killing which made me feel angry at the doctors. It was my favourite activity since I love dogs and really wanted to help them. Due to this activity, I could show gratitude and my love for dogs.

After a month, we finally got to know in the orientation about SAA Camps. We were going to Abhaneri Village Camp in Rajasthan. Due to heavy rainfall the trip was cancelled. We were all pretty disappointed, but we got a chance to go to Jim Corbett, Clarissa Resort, instead. Reaching there was a whole new world. The first day we had fun as there was an adventure zone in the resort. During the nigh time I felt homesick as it was my first time being away from my parents. All my roommates including me were comforting each other by talking about their feelings. The second day was a big one for us since we trekked to a nearby school and started with our SAA Activities. I attempted wall-painting as I found that the best and the most creative option. We were divided into groups and were all given various topics. Our group got 'Cleanliness' as our drawing topic. We decided to create a person throwing a plastic water bottle in a dustbin. After creating our painting, we trekked back to the resort and the next day were back at school. 
I can persuade people that would help me raise awareness in a more appropriate way. I also have self-confidence, which would support me during activities like educating or communicating during the activities or projects.

#### reflection:

At first before starting this activity I was not looking forward to it, we were told in our art and design class that we would have to make postcards, teach classes t make origami, and take allot of those paper cranes and postcards and put them up for display which included the whole art class to stay back for a day.

When I was given the task of teaching myp 4 how to make paper cranes, I was initially very frightened. To teach them, I had to first learn how to do it by watchin a video that my art teacher had given me, which was challenging because I also had to finish my incase board coursework. However, because my class was working on it at the same time, my friends were a huge help.

We were each given a section on the day of instruction, and I went to class myp 4 - c during homeroom to present the slides I had created, which included stepby-step instructions on how to make the cranes. The class was very well-behaved, and nearly everyone was interested in making the crane. They even cracked jokes and were incredibly easy to teach. They were respectful and made me feel comfortable about not knowing exactly how to make the cranes perfectly overal I hate public speaking, but I was the only one who had to educate roughly 30 students, so I had no choice but to speak confidently and step beyond of my comfort zone.

The next day after school, the class was split into two groups; the first group worked with hanging the paper cranes, and the group I was in worked with displaying all the postcards and artworks. This whole process required a lot of planning because we had to ensure that every display was well-balanced with appealing artworks and that we also had to edit out a lot of them because half of the artwork was not suitable for display.

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There were definitely times when I was working on this activity when I was completely frustrated because our class wasn't receiving credit for all of our efforts, and I couldn't really understand the idea behind those paper cranes until the assembly for art for peace the following day, when they explained how a sick girl made hundreds of paper cranes in her hospital bed in the hopes that doing so would cure her of her cancer. After hearing that tale, I began to feel grateful for being a part of the occasion and having the opportunity to share it with the many students at our school.

Greetings from Genesis Global School, Noida! We are writing this mail to initiate a request for the donation of laptops to add to our plan of spreading IT awareness amongst the young population of the Wazidpur village, Noida.

First, a brief background about our school. Genesis Global School (GGS) is in A - 12, Noida-Greater Noida Expy, Block B, Sector 132, Noida, Uttar Pradesh 201304. GGS is a CIS Member school, affiliated with the IB and CBSE with collaborations with Clifton College and Middlesex College, UK, L'Ermitage International School, France, and GSD, Spain. It contains classes from Pre-nursery to High School.

The Nangli Wazidpur village project is a student-led project initiated by IB students. The village is in Sec 135, Noida. Our students have visited the village multiple times and, in different surveys and interactions done by our students with the Pradhan of the village and other village stakeholders, the following ideas have been proposed to be taken care of in near future by our students – women empowerment - enabling women to start small-scale enterprises, awareness about health and hygiene, IT training and infrastructure, imparting computer literacy to students, renovation of the library in village schools.

Students decided to cater to these issues in succession. To begin with they have planned to spread IT awareness and related skills because they observed that these are at a minimum among the young learners of the village. Our students had been working regularly with an NGO, Ruhi foundation school situated in the same village, and it was observed that they also lack the resources to develop a good understanding of IT.

As a part of this project, we would focus on the following aspects:

- Imparting computer literacy skills amongst the village students and spreading ITrelated awareness.
- Awareness of health, hygiene, and personality development through YouTube educational videos and Ted talks for which we would need the devices.

To meet our goal, we need to set up good IT infrastructure in the village School and subsequently train the students in the village. The computational training team (responsible for spreading IT awareness) at GGS plans to use around 5 laptops, for imparting required IT training to the students. We seek help from NXP India to help us in our endeavours to prevent the laptops from getting damaged, they would be kept on the Genesis Global School premises.

GGS students would be going to the village every Friday and would conduct computational training workshops at the village. A lesson plan is being prepared for the same, initially, the students would be taught about the basics of operating the laptop followed by writing and sending emails, education about web security, cybersecurity, cybercrime, familiarity with YouTube, and Ted talks.

It would be greatly appreciated if NXP can donate the required laptops to us. The donation of laptops would play an important role in the overall execution of our village project.
