
The Junior Editor says...


Arpit Bansal, XI C

Cooking

Coconut banana smoothie & cheese chilli garlic toast were cooked by chef Sonit! Learners made this healthy smoothie and understood how to replace sugar with other alternatives. They enjoyed learning about this quick snack. Learners learnt a healthy way of making hummus with beetroot. They enjoyed making a simple grilled paneer and beetroot hummus open sandwich. A quiz based on cooking-related information was played in the class. Kids learned many basic terms related to cooking itself.

Photography

Learners learnt about portrait photography and its types. Portrait photography was taught in class and previous topics revised.





Indian Dance

Students learnt a choreography on the song "garj garj aaj megh" and learnt new kathak moves.

Western Dance

Students started learning new open style dance choreography. learners practised the Christmas dance choreography for the Christmas assembly.





Science

An Activity was done to demonstrate optical illusion by exploring the phenomenon of lateral inversion. Learners were able to comprehend the concept of lateral inversion and analyze how multiple reflections take place in mirrors. An activity was done to demonstrate the electrostatic force and show how liquids impact a magnet. Learners were able to understand how objects can be charged by friction and induction and explain that viscosity of the liquids impact the magnetic pull. Two activities were conducted; the aim for the first activity was to extract plastic from milk and for the second activity, it was to conduct a chemical reaction to clean copper pennies using vinegar and salt. Through these, learners were able to carry out the chemical reaction between milk and vinegar to extract organic plastic and perform chemical reaction between metal oxide layer and vinegar/salt.

Debate, quiz and Panel Discussion

Students were able to watch samples of opening and closing arguments, discuss the importance of voice modulation and eye contact. They were also able to understand their roles in legal debates. Learners learnt about the two presentations to be given by the debate club students in the Christmas Assembly and volunteer their names for the same and understand the pattern of practice and participation. The students were able to attempt a fun-facts quiz on India and host it for their fellow attendees. They learnt to modulate their voice, create suspense through pauses or by raising doubts, and declare results with appropriate expression etc.



Music Tabla and Percussion

The students were given a lesson on progressive patterns while playing percussion instruments but due to certain technical issues, the lesson could not be taught to its complete potential. learners learnt filling the beats with different signatures and using them together to create a progressive rhythm cycle using which they can create their own beat patterns. Learners gained a deeper insight on how practice and meditation affect learning and help them grow and improve in their craft.



Music-Guitar

Some selected students were given tablature to learn of Christmas Carols to prepare for a special assembly. The remaining students also carried forward their study of tablature by practicing known contemporary songs. Learners carried forward their learning with the practice of the content that has been assigned to them for the upcoming Christmas assembly.

Music-Piano and Synthesizer

The students had a lesson to help them improve on their fundamentals (Right hand - Chords & Left hand - Melodies) by practising a known pop contemporary song called "Memories" by the group Maroon 5. The learners carried forward their learning by practising the chords melody through a popular song 'Cheap Thrills'. Learners learnt and rehearsed Christmas carols.



Music-Indian Vocals

The students spent time practising some basic vocal exercises and brushing up on the previously taught content. Learners learnt and practised vocal scale, vocal exercises, Sargams and Alankars. Taan of Raag Bhupali and Bandish of Raag Bhupali was practised and taught.



Smart Art

Students chose their own favourite story from a different language as well as wrote their own stories. Then, they created visuals of each and every frame. learners learnt the method of making geometrical designs using circles, triangles, squares and ovals. Still, life painting and composition in background texture were taught. Learners also learnt how to use different papers to do a still life and composition.

Art hub

Peer teaching by Arpita Rathi was done on how a candle stand can be using recycling made material through which the learners understood the process of using recycling waste material to create useful products. Students had their presentations on their research on Folk Arts of India. They were also able to understand the discipline of group presentation and the concept of teamwork.





Literary Strokes

English Department (CBSE)

Art and English are perhaps two of the most appealing and versatile media for creative expression. When the two join hands, the results are unparalleled!

It is important to understand that art is not limited to paint and canvas – it is a much larger arena. Theatre, oratory activities, quizzes, posters, music etc. are also considered artistic variations of the curriculum. Having comprehended the wide ambit of art, the English department attempted to integrate art as part and parcel of their curriculum transaction this year.

Grade VI was encouraged to compose poems on environmental themes – one of which is part of this newsletter. They even composed lyrics in class intermingling music with literature. A panel discussion was conducted by Grade VII discussing theology and sociological concerns. Article writing and poster making in grades VIII and IX expanded the students' horizon further.

Kahoot quizzes were viral this session, and soon, students took over creating the quizzes for their counterparts thereby polishing their leadership skills, IT competence and spoken English as anchors. In grade IX, students were given ample opportunities to create group presentations on their favourite scientists, generate memes on wildlife themes, write stories and poems and mock interviews. Vocabulary games such as hangman and educandy puzzles were also interspersed through the curriculum.

Classes X to XII used Padlet walls for confessions, vocabulary building and indulged in quizzes on various art forms of India. Creative assignments and debates on various topical issues further enhanced their expression and socio-cultural awareness. Moreover, such activities ensure that students learn problem-solving, critical analysis, collaboration and polish their oratory skills

They played for hours,


She could talk to the flowers.

The light of sky is real, But my wings are full of fear,


I feel discouraged to speak

I am an introvert.


What I say gold for myself but, old for any other I am not just an introvert but a game-changer. Yes, I am an introvert.


The Old Friendly Tree







A Journey Just Like This








Meet the team
